CANADIAN OPINION ON THE CORONA VIRUS – PART 8: WHEN DO CANADIANS THINK THAT LIFE WILL RETURN TO NORMAL?

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INTRODUCTION

While US President Donald Trump hopes that things will return to some degree or normalcy by Easter that optimism may not be shared by many of our neighbors south of what is now a closed border. In Canada, a Leger survey in partnership with the Association for Canadian Studies reveals that some two in three Canadians feel it will be a few months before life returns to normal. It is the province of Quebec that the survey points to a higher degree of optimism that things will return to normal sooner rather than later with the 35% feeling that normalcy will could return in a few weeks.

METHODOLOGY

Web survey using computer-assisted Web interviewing (CAWI) technology.

From March 20th to March 22nd, 2020.

1,508 Canadians, 18 years of age or older, randomly recruited from LEO's online panel.

Using data from the 2016 Census, results were weighted according to gender, age, mother tongue, region, education level and presence of children in the household in order to ensure a representative sample of the population. No margin of error can be associated with a non-probability sample (Web panel in this case). However for comparative purposes, a probability sample of 1,508 respondents would have a margin of error of ±2.52%, 19 times out of 20. That 'margin' rises for survey sub groups.

DETAILED METHODOLOGY

Sampling Frame

Participants were randomly selected from LEO's online panel.

Leger owns and manages an Internet panel that includes more than 400,000 Canadians coast to coast. An online panel consists of Web users profiled according to different demographic variables. The majority of Leger's panel members (60%) were randomly recruited over the phone in the past ten years, which makes this panel very similar to the current Canadian population on a number of demographic characteristics. Moreover, 35% of panellists were recruited through affiliate programs and 5% through partner campaigns and programs.

To be eligible, respondents were required to be 18 years of age or older.

Weighted and Unweighted Sample
